# COVIDTEST.gov Now Open for Ordering

The Administration for Strategic Preparedness and Response (ASPR) reopened the website <u>COVIDtests.gov</u> earlier this week, so that households across the country can order four additional over-the-counter COVID-19 tests for free.

These tests are intended for use throughout the 2024 holiday season to detect currently circulating COVID-19 variants. Clear instructions are included on how to verify extended expiration dates.

MN Association for Children's Mental Health (MACMH) is bringing Dr. Stacey Patton to the Twin Cities for two days February 27 & 28, 2025.



#### **Restorative Grant Reviewers**

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) is recruiting community members to evaluate grant applications for the 2024 Restorative Practices Initiatives Grant Program application review process and other requests for proposals (RFPs) coming from OJP. OJP is interested in reviewers who reflect the ethnic, racial, economic, cultural, and geographic diversity of Minnesota. For each RFP, OJP recruits individuals with knowledge, expertise, or lived experience specific to that RFP's subject matter. OJP is often looking for individuals such as community members with justice system experience, survivors of crime, crime victim service providers, youth service providers, county attorney staff, social service workers, evaluators, and educators. Serving in this capacity offers unique insights into the grant-making process.
